Teaching and Learning Overview P3

In Reading, pupils will learn to ask question to help make sense of a text. They will explore the difference between literal and inferential questions.

In Writing, pupils will develop their story writing skills. They will learn how to structure their ideas, develop description and create interesting characters through describing their feelings, actions and appearance.

In Talking and Listening, pupils will develop their ability to present information to others in a creative way. They will learn how to be a good audience and to ask and respond to questions appropriately.

Through daily literacy activities, pupils will continue to develop their handwriting presentation, dictionary skills, spelling accuracy and reading fluency.

Numeracy and Mathematics

The pupils will:

- continue to develop a range of counting and calculation skills
- further develop their time reading skills and begin to explore AM/PM
- learn to measure distance in centimetres and metres
- further explore the link between fractions and division

Health and Wellbeing

Through the Building Resilience topic 'Respect Yourself'', pupils will learn that we all have similarities and differences but we are all unique. They will learn to recognise and celebrate their personal strengths and skills and those of others.

In PE, pupils will develop their core strength, rhythm and timing through dance and gymnastics activities. They will learn to sequence and connect movements creatively and give and receive constructive feedback.

Through our context for learning, pupils will learn how to react in a range of unsafe situations and emergencies and develop their understanding of travel safety.
