

# **Kettins Primary School Curriculum Rationale**

### **Values**

- Everyone is encouraged to do their best and to achieve in their learning both within and out with school – we all have high aspirations.
- The school has a positive, inclusive ethos where everyone is valued, respected, safe and supported to achieve their potential and where the views of all are considered and acted upon.
- Review and develop a shared Vison, Values and Aims which are relevant to and have been created by current staff, parents and pupils. The values should underpin all we do in our school.
- We provide a rich, inclusive, relevant and motivating learning environment in order to meet the needs of all learners.
- Staff understand the principles and practices of GIRFEC and their roles and responsibilities in meeting universal needs.

# **Totality of the Curriculum**

- Success is celebrated widely, and there are greater opportunities for success for all
- There are planned opportunities for all children to contribute towards the life and ethos of the school and to develop and achieve their potential as individuals.
- Progression in learning of core skills is planned for alongside meaningful, relevant interdisciplinary learning.
- Outdoor learning takes place as part of discrete subject development and IDL.
- Sustainable development, international education, enterprise and creativity are prominent themes within our curriculum.

# Learning and Teaching

- Active learning approaches are evident across the school, staff work together to plan rich and relevant contexts for learning.
- All pupils receive excellent opportunities to learn more actively from real life contexts, outdoor learning, ICT, trips and visitors, benefitting from the relevance and meaning these bring.
- All learners are actively involved in planning their own learning, agreeing success criteria and identifying their next steps.
- There are shared expectations and standards across the school in all aspects of the curriculum and a shared understanding of effective learning and teaching approaches
- Staff visit other schools to observe and share excellent practice and participate in LMG and school moderation activities.

### **Experiences and Outcomes**

- A progressive literacy, numeracy and HWB programme has been created which ensures skills progression, and incorporate the benchmarks.
- Skills development within curriculum areas are beginning to be identified and planned for.
- Es and Os are developed through the four contexts for learning, providing varied, relevant and meaningful learning experiences - links are made between curricular areas as appropriate.
- Staff continue to work with increasing confidence with Es and Os, progression frameworks and benchmarks in other curricular areas.

## **Entitlements**

- Our pupils experience a broad, coherent and relevant curriculum which meets their needs and takes account of the local and national context.
- All children have appropriate opportunities to develop their skills for learning, life and work, including the skills and attributes of the four capacities and can talk about their progress in this area.
- All our children engage in learning experiences which enable them to develop their understanding of our world and Scotland's place in it, supported by their families and our community.
- Our children, families, staff and community have high expectations of themselves and the school and play a significant role in improving our school. Every child experiences success.

# **Support**

- All stakeholders are clear about agreed policy and practice in this area.
- Support needs for each child are identified, addressed and reviewed as needed to ensure that learning experiences meet their needs and that we make best use of all available resources.
- Established transition arrangements between Nursery and Secondary.
- Appropriate differentiation is apparent in both classes.
- Pupils progress at a suitable pace and are aware of their next steps in learning and how to achieve them.

### **Principles**

- Personalisation and choice is integrated into the planning phases of interdisciplinary learning.
- Breadth, depth and challenge are provided through a blend of discrete subject development and interdisciplinary learning.
- Review our curriculum to ensure the seven principles of curriculum design underpin all planned learning experiences and are consistently used as an integral part of the quality assurance process

### Assessment

- The continuous cycle of learning, teaching and assessment is built on a sound foundation underpinned by the principles of AiFL.
- Pupil progress is tracked in literacy and numeracy, three times a year.
- Pupil profiles are a summary of the pupil's latest and best achievements, and within these there is evidence of breadth, challenge and application of knowledge, skills and attribute.
- Moderation processes are used to evaluate learning and plan next steps and enable us to make sound judgements about each learner's progress.
