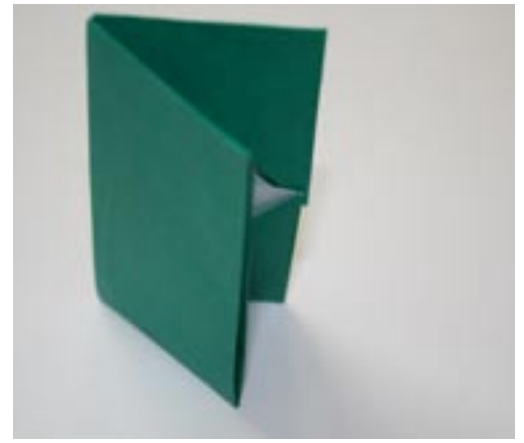


Origami Wallet / Folder

This wallet / folder is a traditional origami fold and it can be made in many different sizes and used in many different ways. Papers, notes, photographs and other treasures can be tucked inside.

You will need a large square of paper if you want to use it as a conventional wallet, and a very large square for a folder. We used a 6x6" square of origami paper and our finished wallet was quite small - perfect for a set of "promise" coupons to give to someone special!



1. Start with your paper coloured-side down. Fold in half vertically, crease, then open up again.



2. Fold the sides into the centre, crease, and open.



3. Fold each of the corners in, lining them up with the crease marks, as shown.



4. Fold the sides into the middle again.



5. Flip over.



6. Fold the top edge down as shown, and crease well.

7. Now fold the bottom edge up so that it overlaps the other flap slightly and crease well.



8. Tuck the bottom flap inside the top flap.



9. Fold in half, and your wallet is made! You can tuck all sorts of things inside this useful wallet or folder!



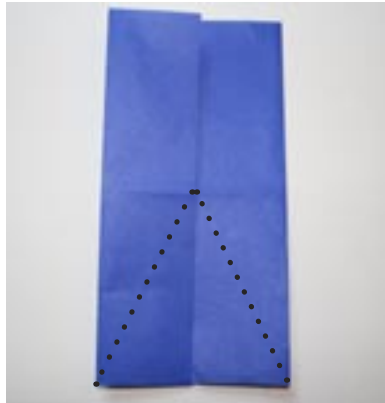
Origami Shirt

This origami shirt is fun to fold but a little fiddly.

Make one for the front of a greetings card - perhaps for Dad? You could add an origami tie (use 2 1/2 inch square paper for the tie and 6 inch square paper for the shirt). Perhaps you could decorate the shirt in your favourite team's colours?



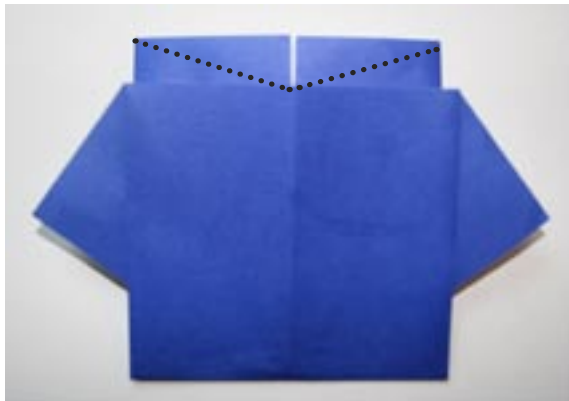
1. Start with your square face down. Fold in half horizontally and vertically, to crease, as shown.



2. Bring the sides into the centre. Fold the flaps out along the dotted lines, as shown....



3. ...so that your model looks like this. Now fold the bottom up towards the top along the dotted line, and crease well.

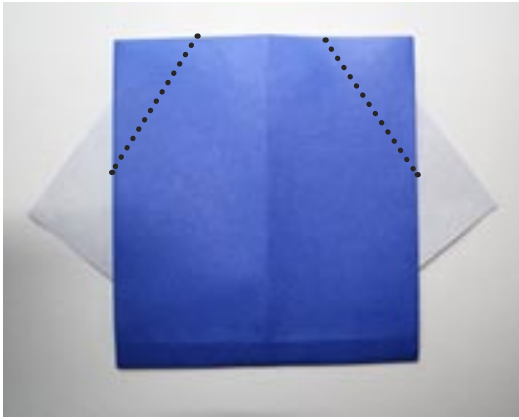


4. Your shirt is beginning to take shape! Form the collar by turning the top flaps down along the dotted lines.



5. Like so.

6. Flip over. Continue to shape the collar by folding in the edges as shown ...



7. .. and make a tiny little fold at the top so that the proportions of the collar are right.



8. Flip over for your finished shirt! If you like, you can fold the shoulders back a tiny amount to give your shirt a slightly different shape, but it is not necessary.

Origami Business Card Holder

A perfect little present for someone who has their own business cards, this business card holder is not only useful - but you can make it extra special by choosing really nice paper and decorating it any way you like after folding.

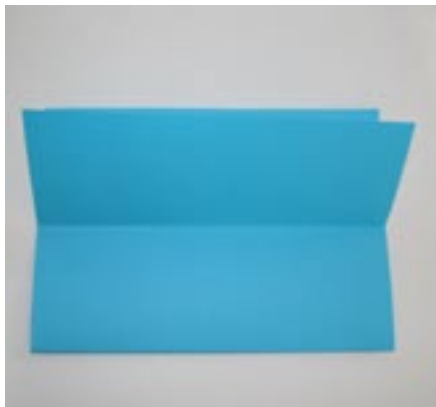
Some clever folding gives you a holder with four separate pockets - 2 on the outside and 2 on the inside. And when it gets tatty .. just fold another!



1. Start with a piece of A4 or letter-sized paper.

2. Fold the bottom edge up to meet the top edge.

3. Fold the top flap back down again, to meet the bottom edge, as shown. Crease well.



4. Unfold.

5. Flip over and repeat on the other side.

6. Fold a small amount down on the top edge, as shown.

7. Flip over and do the same on the other side.



8. Fold the top corners down, as shown, so that they meet the crease mark.



9. Flip over, and repeat.



10. Bring the top flap down as shown in the photo.



11. Flip over and repeat. Crease well.



12. Open out (like a book, leaving the folded flaps underneath) and turn side-



13. Fold up the bottom edge, as shown.

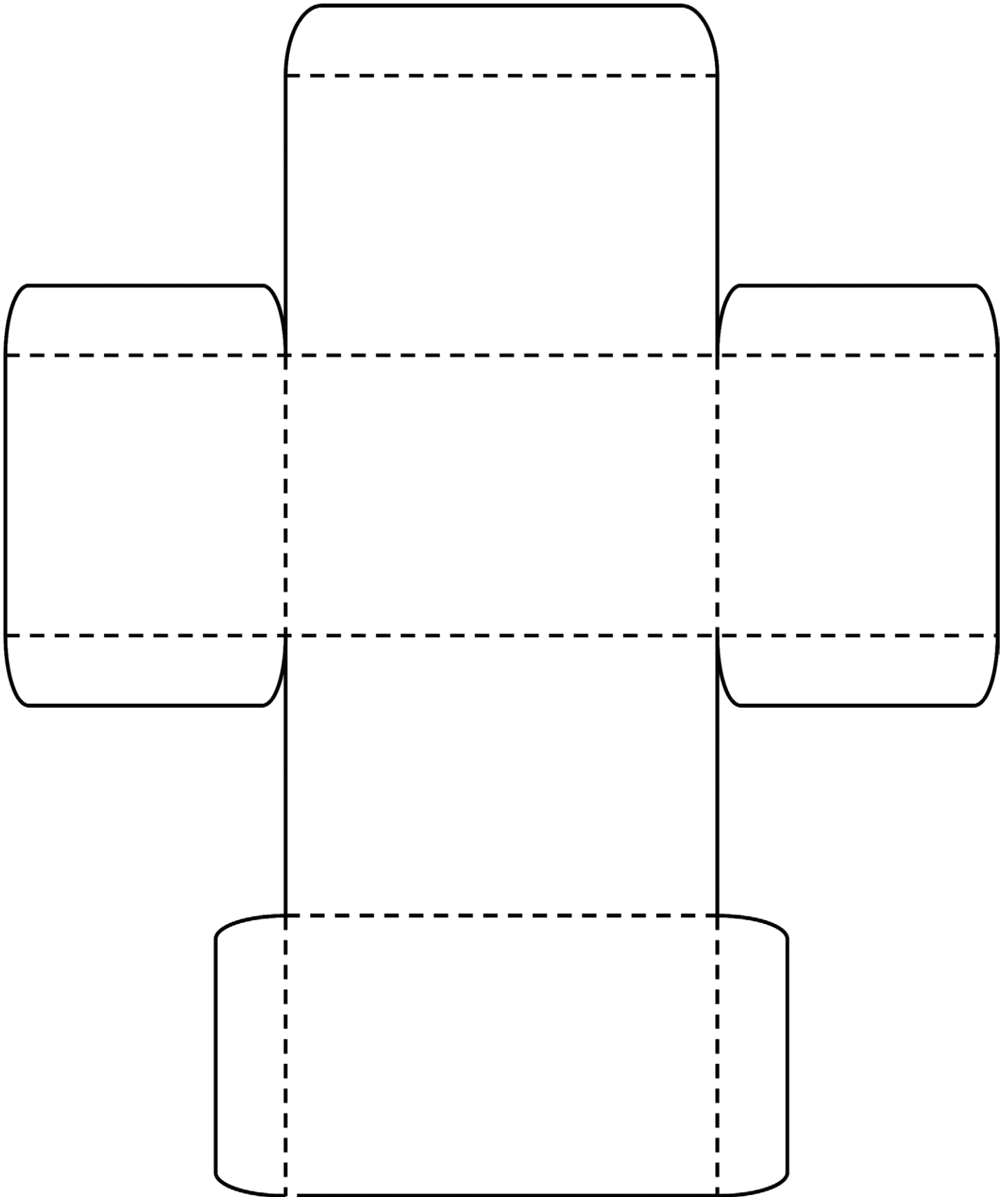


14. Fold the top edge down to meet the bottom edge.

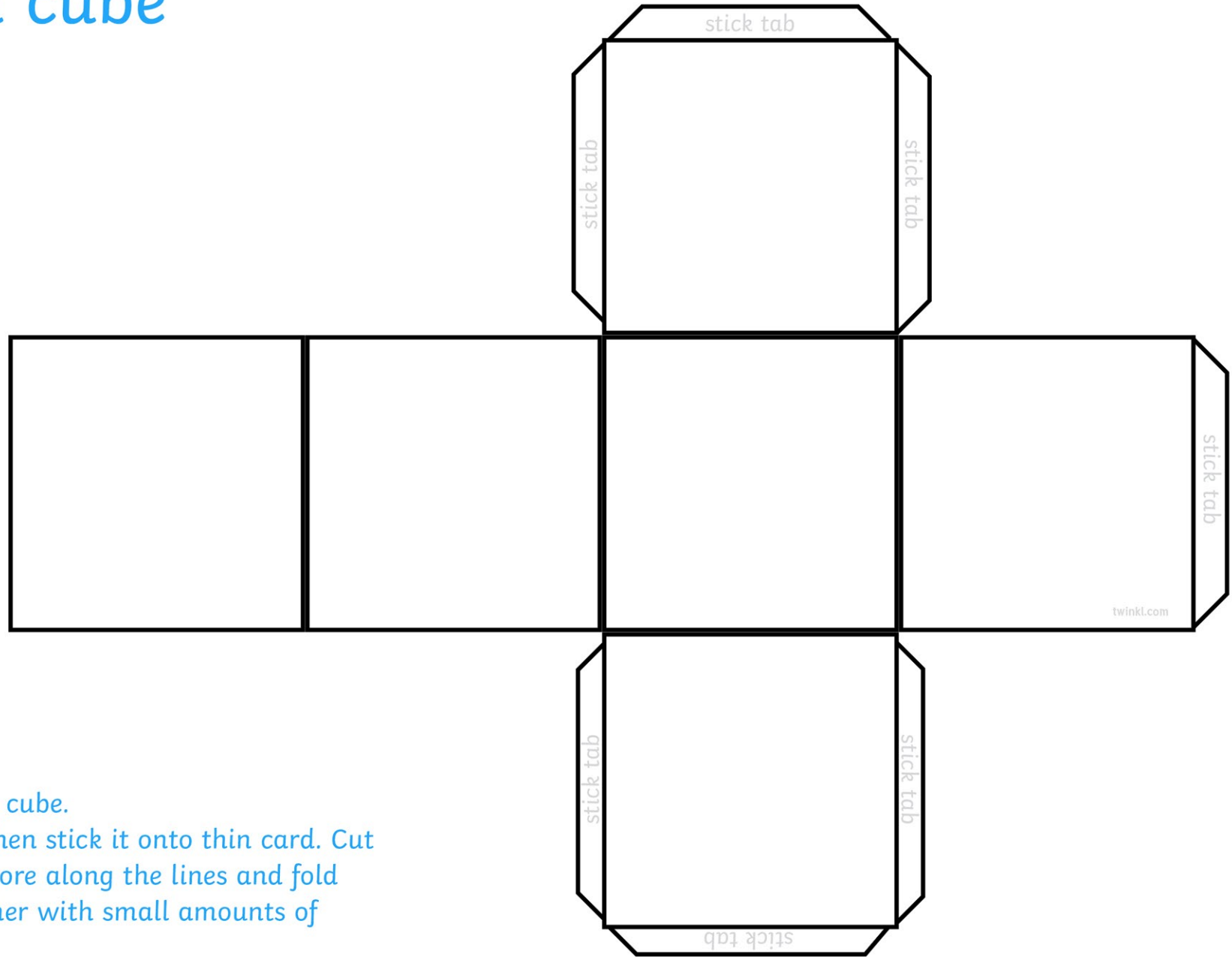


15. Tuck the corners inside the corners of the flap underneath, as shown. Fold in half along the dotted line, and your business card holder is ready!

Cuboid Net



Net of a cube



This is a net for a cube.

Print it out and then stick it onto thin card. Cut it out and then score along the lines and fold them. Stick together with small amounts of glue.
