There's a new, free resource for S1 science, health and social studies teachers, to support the HPV vaccination programme that's now offered in schools to S1 boys and girls.

Kids Boost Immunity (KBI) is an online World Health Organization accredited resource for Scottish students that pairs local learning with a global reward: vaccines for children in developing countries through UNICEF. It's a new approach to learning, developed with Education Scotland to align with the Curriculum for Excellence.

KBI's lessons are linked to science, health and social studies on topics including:

- The immune system
- Vaccines (including the HPV vaccine)
- Germs and infections
- The spread of infectious disease and outbreaks
- Evaluating online information sources
- Global inequality in health



How it works

After completing a lesson in class, students take online quizzes to earn vaccines in support of UNICEF Scotland. The more quizzes a student completes, the more vaccines they earn for kids in another part of the world.

By completing KBI lessons and quizzes with their class, teachers can help prime pupils about the HPV vaccine, which will be extended to S1 boys as well as girls from academic year 2019/20. This will support informed consent, and may help increase both consent form return rates and uptake of the HPV vaccine.

- Register as a teacher and complete the required information, including your work email address and selecting 'United Kingdom' as your country.
- You will receive an email to confirm your registration and be prompted to create a team for your class.
- Create a class name and your own unique team registration code to enable students to join your team.
