Foreword

Throughout Scotland, there continues to be a substantial growth in interest in instrumental music participation.

Authorities, in seeking to further enrich the educational experience available to school pupils, regard instrumental provision as offering a further dimension to the school curriculum.

As well as the benefits available to the individual pupil, numbers of instrumental ensembles in school, regional and national youth orchestras and bands continue to develop offering further musical opportunities.

Instrumental music education, both formal and informal, is recognised in preparing children for life. The ability to perform on a musical instrument fosters creativity and teaches critical assessment of the world around us and instils the basic values of self-discipline.

During Covid 19 restrictions and guidance, the benefits and advantages pupils gained from playing a musical instrument proved to be particularly important. Music making and learning to play a musical instrument is one of the most effective contributors in developing and sustaining pupils' welfare.

In recognition of the integral part instrumental music plays in pupils' education and welfare, Scottish Government has announced that instrumental music lessons will be delivered free of charge.

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Benefits

The following benefits of learning to play a musical instrument are recognised by all who are involved in the teaching process:

- Your child, when learning to play a musical instrument, develops a wide range of unique skills providing a means of fulfilment and enjoyment whilst nurturing a greater understanding of the arts.
- You, as parents, can enjoy and share the child's excitement in learning to play an instrument. Your child performing at a concert will provide you with a great sense of pride and satisfaction.
- Schools will provide opportunities for pupils to enrich their curriculum and the life of the school. This offers an additional focus for the arts and enhances the profile of the school.
- Instrumental music prepares pupils to make a meaningful contribution towards the artistic life of their community.
- Research has indicated that pupils' attainment in learning and teaching across all subjects within the whole school curriculum is enhanced by studying a musical instrument.

The Perth and Kinross Instrumental Service consists of thirty-one permanent and part-time staff offering instruction on Strings, Brass, Woodwind, Percussion, Piano, Guitar, Singing and Bagpipes.

The majority of staff are Conservatoire graduates which means they are exceptionally well qualified and experienced in delivering instrumental teaching.

All new staff are carefully selected through the interview process which includes criminal record checks for the safety of the pupils.

Within pandemic guidance and restrictions, the Perth & Kinross Instrumental Music Service will continue to deliver top quality music provision using the best teaching techniques and methods of delivery available within the safety constraints and measures necessary in the present situation and circumstances. The Music Service will continue to review provision in the light of government advice to allow maximum personal interaction between the Instrumental Music Service staff and pupils in this evolving landscape.

Woodwind, Brass and Vocal lessons are now being able to be delivered in most cases in schools with the appropriate Covid-19 safety measures and mitigations. Please note, safety procedures for Woodwind, Brass and Vocal provision are being continuously reviewed by Scottish Government and provision will be delivered based on Government guidelines.

Objectives

The following objectives are based on a study of good practice evident in the distinct nature of the work of instrumental staff currently employed in Perth and Kinross Schools.

- To provide opportunities of access for all pupils to experience the expressive and creative qualities of music through learning to play a musical instrument as part of education for life.
- To encourage and enable pupils to realise their full potential through the mastery of technical skills, the development of musical perception and aesthetic sensitivity. To encourage self-confidence and develop a sense of achievement and self-expression.
- To offer musical experiences. To enhance and support the music curriculum. To help pupils acquire skills which will allow them to enjoy and become actively involved in a wide range of musical experiences contributing to the musical life of the school and the community.
- To develop skills. To encourage and assist pupils to develop their intellectual, affective, psychomotor, social and personal skills. To help pupils foster an understanding of music in the everyday life of their own and other cultures. Research has indicated that these instrumental music skills enhance pupils' overall learning attainment across the whole curriculum as well as enriching personal wellbeing.

The above objectives are particularly enhanced by the Perth and Kinross Central Groups (see page 8) which give attending pupils an opportunity to meet, rehearse and socialise with other pupils from all over Perth and Kinross. These groups are considered to be an integral part of the Instrumental Music Service and have been carefully structured to run in conjunction with school tuition. It is expected that pupils receiving instrumental instruction will make every effort to attend these Central Groups in order that they can utilise this provision to the maximum.

Registration and selection procedures

Full details of the Instrumental Music Service and details of how to apply for tuition are available on the Instrumental Music Service's website <u>www.pkcmusic.com</u> or through the Instrumental Music Service App which can be downloaded **free of charge** from the Apple and Google Play Stores by searching "School App for Parents" and adding "Perth & Kinross Instrumental Music Service" from the school list available.

Any pupils wishing to access tuition for the first time should register online. A link to apply will also be available on both schools and Instrumental Music Service websites.

Applicants will be assessed for suitability towards learning an instrument (involving tests in pitch, rhythm and other musical attributes). Successful applicants will be notified and issued with a link to complete an online application.

Tuition will only commence on receipt of the completed form.

If or when one to one online lessons require to be delivered, parents will be expected to agree to safeguarding conditions laid out in application.

In the event of pandemic restrictions being introduced, or increased, the Perth & Kinross Instrumental Music Service will continue to deliver top quality music provision using the best teaching techniques and methods of delivery available within the safety constraints and measures necessary. When music tuition is delivered either in the school or home environment via digital platforms, pupils will be expected to:

- only use their GLOW email address for class communication
- be punctual for all lessons
- access the files for each lesson in advance and have the materials to hand
- make sure they have all power adaptors, laptops, screen connections ready before the lesson begins
- submit all assignments on time in accordance to the agreed protocols
- show respect for everyone in the online classroom
- dress appropriately for all classes, thinking about modesty and respect for others
- ensure the location they log in from is appropriate, ie give consideration to background, camera angle, privacy etc.
- seek to contribute to the class in a positive manner and not be disruptive at any time
- not share recordings/images of the class outwith the class environment

Parents of pupils who unfortunately are not able to access the Service immediately due to availability of places will receive communication, via email where possible, and the pupil's name will be added to the instructor's waiting list. Parents will be notified if a space becomes available in the future.

A basic instrument is supplied initially with a view to pupils obtaining their own instrument when compatibility has been realised.

Staff deployment



Initially, priority of instruction time goes to the secondary schools where Education and Children's Services strive to offer each school an equal, balanced amount of instruction. Instrumental staff will teach a balanced number of pupils from years 1 - 6 to ensure constant pupil progress and to allow opportunity to access the service in 1st year and continue right through until 6th year. Any remaining instructors' time is then deployed in primary schools where, again, the emphasis is on a fair distribution and delivery of instruction amongst the feeding primary schools of each secondary.

Upon selection, the successful pupils commence their tuition usually in the form of small group lessons. Experience has shown that this generally proved to be the best policy for beginners. Receiving tuition with their friends helps to make the pupils feel more relaxed and gives them the opportunity of both solo and ensemble playing within their lessons from the very start.

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In the initial stages of tuition, it is widely accepted that group tuition is more beneficial than one to one teaching.

Your child will then continue to receive well structured, pre-planned instrumental lessons with professional calculated attainment targets.

After a very short period, pupils will be ready to attend one of the Perth and Kinross Central Groups (see page 8). These ensembles, which have been carefully designed to run in conjunction with instrumental tuition in schools, can accommodate pupils at all levels from beginners to advanced and are an integral part of tuition.

Pupils receiving tuition will also enjoy being an active member of their school orchestras, ensembles and chamber groups, participating in Christmas Carol Concerts, Music Festivals, Perth Festival of the Arts and prize-givings. Occasionally professional bodies will visit the schools to give workshops and masterclasses.

The structuring of instrumental teaching in Perth and Kinross schools means that if your child gets the opportunity to receive lessons at primary school, they will usually be able to continue lessons with the same teacher through to the end of secondary school, incorporating all SQA and Associated Board music examinations if required. Pupils wishing to progress on to Music Colleges, e.g. Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, will be assisted (non-financial) with entrance exam and auditions. Parents will be responsible for Associated Board fees.

The overall standard of instrumental tuition is continuously monitored and assessed and is constantly being developed as a result of in-service training and inter-staff discussions.



Registration

Music Camps

Pupils receiving instruction and/or attending Central Groups will also get the opportunity to attend the annual Junior, Intermediate and Senior music camps. These residential courses are a unique mixture of hard work, musical creativity and fun, and for many who attend, it is the highlight of their academic year.

Music Tuition

The Scottish Government has announced there will be no charge for Instrumental Music lessons for 2021-22.

A minimum of 30 lessons will be delivered for Instrumental pupils in each academic session. Pupils accessing the service for the first time later in the session may receive less for their first year but will receive the full quota thereafter.

Central Groups

The Scottish Government has announced there will be no charge for Instrumental Central Groups for 2021-22.

Music Camps

TBC – subject to Covid restrictions, application forms for Music Camps will be issued to Central Groups pupils in the first instance in January 2022. Places will be opened out to all pupils should there be spaces available nearer the camp dates. Costs will be confirmed early in the new session.

Note – To enable your child to attend Music Camp full payment must be received prior to attending camp.

There will be a charge for participation in these music camps but subsidised places are available through the Young Musicians' Parents' Association (YMPA). Criteria for funding will be included in the camp invitation correspondence.

Instrumental Tuition and Central Groups Terms and Conditions of Acceptance

Your child is being offered instrumental tuition under the Perth & Kinross Council scheme which is subject to acceptance of the following conditions by the parent/guardian concerned:

- 1. Lessons will be delivered on a blended basis of face to face and some digital lessons.
- 2. An online application **must** be submitted for each pupil who wishes to access the Instrumental Music Service. Services **will not** be provided to pupils if no application has been received.
- 3. It is strongly advised that pupils receiving tuition in school strive to attend one of the Central Groups as this is recognised as an integral part of tuition.
- 4. Instruments on loan to pupils for instrumental tuition are provided on the understanding that reasonable care is exercised over their safekeeping. Parents are advised that in the event of evidence that reasonable care has not been exercised, they may be required to contribute towards the repair/replacement cost of the damaged or lost instruments. Pupils/Parents should alert the relevant instructor of any repair required on an authority instrument. The instructor will then arrange for the instrument to be repaired through the Perth and Kinross Instrument Repair Service. Under no circumstances should any repair on a Perth and Kinross instrument be carried out privately. Parents are encouraged to take out insurance on Perth and Kinross instruments. In most cases, normal house contents insurance is adequate to cover any damages.
- 5. If recommended by the tutor, the parent or guardian concerned may be asked to consider providing the pupil with his or her own instrument. The Council accepts no liability for any costs incurred in acquiring an instrument. In most cases, parents will be able to purchase a new instrument through the Perth and Kinross Instrument Purchase Scheme, which allows the pupil to buy an instrument without paying VAT. Full details regarding this scheme are available from all school administrators and instrumental music staff.
- 6. If a pupil wishes to withdraw from lessons, written notice must be given to their Instructor or emailed to the Instrumental Music Service on <u>Musicservice@pkc.gov.uk</u>.
- 7. If a pupil wishes to withdraw from Central Groups, written notice must be given to the Orchestra Conductor or emailed to the Instrumental Music Service on <u>Musicservice@pkc.gov.uk</u>.
- 8. Communications. Please note information will be disseminated to parents and our main source of communication will be delivered via our Instrumental Music Service App. We strongly recommend all parents download this App. Please see below for download instructions.

Information for parents

Lessons in primary school will normally take place at the same time each week.

In secondary school, your child will be withdrawn from their subject classes on a rota basis. The Authority will endeavor to ensure that your child does not regularly miss any one subject.

Upon commencement, lessons will usually be delivered on a weekly basis and are timetabled for between 15 and 40 minutes (dependent on child's age, group activities within school time etc) during which time, your child may be taught in a small group of no more than 8 pupils. The majority of these lessons will be delivered in the first three terms, August 2021 – April 2022. There will still be tuition delivered as much as possible in the Summer term however, Instructors will be in attendance at the residential music courses and the annual Instrumental Music Service Engagement week that are held in the final term.

Should your child's lessons be affected by prolonged instructor absence, cover will be provided by the Authority.

In normal circumstances, pupils will be allowed the opportunity to access instruction on one instrument only. However, in certain circumstances, access to learning a second instrument may occasionally be available, subject to Instructor availability.
